After registering, you will receive a confirmation email containing information about joining the meeting. You may want to arrange to view the livestream at your church so that others may join you for viewing and discussion.

The panel discussion will include the history of Land Acknowledgements, what they are and are not, and how they can help build community. A video of the discussion will be made available for free use by congregations and others.

Panelists will include Bishop Anne Edison-Albright; President Shannon Holsey of the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohican Indians; Ron Brooks, CEO of Brooks Family Farms, Waupaca and Member of Waupaca Schools Board of Education; Guy Reiter (Anahkwet), member of the Menominee Nation, Director of Menikanaehkem (Community Builders) Organization on the Menominee Reservation in Wisconsin; and two national leaders in this work. George Tinker is an Osage Indian Scholar, professor emeritus of American Indian Culture and Religious Traditions at Iliff School of Theology in Denver. His best known book is *American Indian Liberation: A Theology of Sovereignty* (2008). Steven Newcomb is a Shawnee-Lenape scholar and author, co-founder of the Indigenous Law Institute. He wrote *Pagans in the Promised Land: Decoding the Doctrine of Discovery* (2008). Panel moderator will be Randy Johnson of St. John's Ashwaubenon.

Milwaukee Bus Trip to GGMBC and America's Black Holocaust Museum

A one day coach bus trip is being planned for a Sunday in June. We will worship at Greater Galilee Missionary Baptist Church, have lunch, and then visit America's Black Holocaust Museum. The tentative date is June 11. Watch for more information.

Now is the Time Study of the Declaration of the ELCA to People of African Descent

Thirty-five people participated in this five-week study in three groups - two via Zoom and one in person. The discussions were thought-provoking and the learning deep. The synod Racial Equity Team will offer this study again as well as others. If you would like to co lead the Now is the Time study, Randy Johnson has prepared materials to help you do so.

Ideas to Learn More about Racism:

- Participate in a virtual or in person book or film study. Contact Shirley Paulson (<u>spaulson1949@gmail.com</u>) if you would like to be informed of when training for leading a study is offered or if you'd like to be informed about other opportunities to learn about racism and what we can do.
- Watch a documentary on racism such Ava DuVernay's 13th or a movie such as Twelve Years a Slave or Just Mercy - the story of Bryan Stevenson - either as an individual or in a group.
- Read as an individual or in a group a book such as Chains by Laurie Halse Anderson. This historical fiction book, recommended by Pat W. from the Now is the Time virtual study, tells the story of a young girl who suffers brutality as a slave. The book includes a study guide for family, school, or adult groups. Still on the list of good books are Trouble I've Seen: Changing the Way the Church Views Racism by Drew G.I. Hart, White Fragility by Robin DeAngelo or, another good historical fiction book, The Invention of Wings by Sue Monk Kidd.

How Can We Help? One Congregation's Story of Learning About an Important Need and Working to Meet that Need


After reading an article in *The Christian Century* magazine about Period Poverty, there was a discussion at Our Redeemer's women's group meeting about how expensive feminine hygiene products are. There was much discussion and many stories about how bad the situation is for some women who cannot afford these products. During the discussion it was stated that these products are not covered by the food stamp program or any other program because they are deemed non-essential. Lists of state and federal representatives were distributed for people to write to them and let them know that these products are essential. Menstruation supplies are expensive and stigmatized. Many people just go without. In addition to causing stress, this is a health problem.

We looked into whether the food bank could distribute the feminine products and then went looking for other places we could supply the feminine products to. There are two public libraries in our community and a women's shelter that were approached to see if they would be interested in having these products available in their facilities. We found most were receptive to the idea. It was decided that we would look into purchasing supplies. After some searching, we found Aunt Flow was willing to help us supply feminine products at a cost we could afford. Aunt Flow information was also in the article in *The Christian Century* magazine. Www.AuntFlow.com is a website with the goal of ensuring that everyone has access to menstrual products. There is another


organization called Period.org that is a global group powered by youth.

Since then, there have been other articles out there telling the need. The schools have supplies through the health nurse. It seems so simple and is such a needed program to help struggling people. Menstruation has been a subject that for a long time has not been discussed or showed concern over. People felt they could not talk about a normal bodily function and ways to help people with limited resources to meet this need. Our program was begun to address this need on a local level.

Listening to God by Phyllis Christie

Many of our congregations are experiencing the process of transition now, some have just completed the process, and others will need to complete it in the future. Discernment (coming to know or to recognize) is commonly the first part of the journey in transition. In the process of discernment, time and patience are probably the most important concepts to remember.

These concepts can also be utilized in daily devotional practices. In our busy, cluttered lives it is often hard to take time out, to be patient. We read our "daily devotion" then hurry off to do all the other things on our "TO DO" list. We feel good as we check off all those items on our lists. But have we accomplished, on a spiritual level, the "daily devotion"? Have we taken time and been patient during our conversation with God or have we had a one-sided conversation with us doing all the talking/praying?

Consider time and patience in your next daily devotion. Try reading the passage three times with time between to listen and to ponder. Or read the passage from three different translations to hear variations from time and culture. In a group devotion, have three different voices read aloud to hear incremental differences of tone and emphasis. With each reading, find a phrase or word that touches your heart or your soul. Lean into those words and phrases as you would in a conversation with a friend. Are they God's portion of your conversation with Him? Take time, be patient, let go, let God speak too. Isn't that why we put "daily devotion" on our "TO DO" list in the first place?

Footnote: The Scriptures are a reference book and a book for meaning and yet they are more than that. When you let the words wash over you, like reading them three times through a practice called **lectio divina**, sacred reading, something different occurs. The phrase lectio divina means "**divine reading**" in Latin and is a fitting name for this prayer practice of listening to Scripture with the ear of the heart. Lectio divina (often called "lectio" for short) is a dialogue with God through Scripture that includes the whole self: thoughts, images, memories, desires, etc.

A Recipe from the Cooking with Crossways Cookbook submitted by Lois Hilger

Zucchini Cranberry Bread Muffins

Mix: 3 eggs (beaten), 1 cup canola oil, 1 ¾ cups sugar, 2 cups zucchini (peeled and grated), 1 tsp. vanilla

Add and mix until well blended: 3 cups flour, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. soda, 3 tsp. cinnamon, ½ tsp. baking powder, ½ cup chopped nuts, 2 cups fresh cranberries

(sliced), zest of one orange

Pour into 24 muffin cups. Bake for 30 minutes at 325 degrees.

All About Thankofferings...

The concept of Thankoffering celebrations dates back more than 100 years and beyond Lutherans. The Episcopal Church Women held their first recorded Thankoffering service in 1889, and the World ThankOffering service of the United Methodist Women has been a tradition for over 100 years as well. In the Lutheran tradition, the first Thankoffering service was held in 1889 to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the organization. At that first Thankoffering, \$6,100 was collected. Today, Women of the ELCA collects more than \$1 million in Thankofferings annually for the ministries and mission of our women's organization. Our founders would be amazed to see what that covers these days!

Thankofferings show gratitude for God's blessings and give us an important and tangible way to express that gratitude. It is a tradition grounded in our celebration of community, of meeting together to joyfully give thanks for what God has given us. Thankofferings have always been, and still are, our opportunity to say thank you to God in both significant and ordinary moments.

Giving Thankofferings is grounded in scripture and in The Women of the ELCA constitution: "... Thankofferings shall be gifts from individuals in gratitude for blessings. These offerings shall be received ... and transmitted in full to the churchwide organization for the support of the ministries of this organization and the church" (Article X, Churchwide Women's Organization Constitution, Section 4, Item 1).

Thankofferings are to support the ongoing ministries of the churchwide women's organization. Our ongoing ministries include our many online and printed communications, our justice and advocacy work, training and development for elected leaders throughout the women's organization, our constant work in support of congregational and synodical women's organizations, the administration of our grants and scholarship programs, our triennial convention and gathering, which will be held this coming September in Phoenix, and so much more.

Women of the ELCA's website, <u>www.welca.org</u>, has more information about the organization's structure, the publications available and how to subscribe either on-line or by mail. And there is also information about the many resources and Bible Studies available, free for the asking, provided in part by these Thankofferings.

It's been shown time and again that gratitude is good for us – spiritually, mentally, and even physically. Making a Thankoffering is gratitude in action. And Women of the ELCA is grateful to you for taking this action. Thank you.
